

Wyoming

Wyoming's 17,144 small employers and 43,950 nonemployers make significant contributions to the state's economy, and they bring innovative products and services to the marketplace.* They are an important source of employment and opportunity throughout the state. This profile by the Office of Advocacy uses the latest statistics to describe the small business contribution in the greatest possible detail. (Note: A small business is defined as one with fewer than 500 employees.)

- Wyoming's real gross state product increased by 4.4% and private-sector employment increased by 3.1% in 2008. By comparison, real GDP growth in the United States was 0.7% and private-sector employment declined by 0.7%.
- The accommodation and food services industry was the state's largest small business employer in 2006; retail trade was the largest overall employer (Table 1).
- Small businesses are a major force in the state's net job change, as shown in Table 2.
- The number of small employers in Wyoming was 17,144 in 2006, accounting for 96.6% of the state's employers and 66.2% of its private-sector employment. (Source: U.S. Dept. of Commerce: Bureau of the Census.)
